

Guide to choosing Study Abroad modules at University College Cork

Module Objective: To introduce students to the generic and thematic variety of Chaucer's story-collection.

Module Content: This module consists of a detailed study of selections from Chaucer's Canterbury Tales, a late fourteenth-century story collection. Students will read a number of the tales, exploring Chaucer's handling of themes such as authorial and narrative identity, the nature of literature and literary endeavour, sexual politics, and religion. Emphasis will be given to the thematic and dramatic links between tales, establishing the cohesiveness and variety of the work as a story-collection.

Learning Outcomes: On successful completion of this module, students should be able to:

Discuss the origin and concept of The Canterbury Tales. Assess the implications of its generic, formal, and narrative variety. Identify key themes in The Canterbury Tales, such as, gender relationships, authorship, and literary achievement. Discuss a number of individual texts from the collection in the context of the story collection as a whole. Locate their discussion of The Canterbury Tales in wider, appropriate literary and cultural contexts of the Middle Ages, such as attitudes to literature, society and religion.

Assessment: Total Marks 100: Formal Written Examination 100 marks.

Compulsory Elements: Formal Written Examination.

Penalties (for late submission of Course/Project Work etc.): None.

Pass Standard and any Special Requirements for Passing Module: 40%.

Formal Written Examination: 1 x 1.5 hr(s) paper(s) to be taken in Summer 2017.

Requirements for Supplemental Examination: 1 x 1.5 hr(s) paper(s) to be taken in Autumn 2017.
