

Interview with Arber Gashi about the connection between clinical practice and research

Dear Mr. Gashi, you are currently a resident in internal medicine at the Klinikum Oldenburg and a research fellow in Geriatrics at the Department of Health Services Research where you are pursuing an MD/PhD. Please briefly introduce yourself and your research project. #00:00:17-0#

Arber Gashi: Thank you for the invitation. Yes, that is correct. I am currently pursuing an MD/PhD programme at the University of Oldenburg and at the same time I am working as a physician at the Klinikum Oldenburg at the Internal Medicine Department. I was born in Kosovo and as of March 2016, I moved to Germany to take part in an internal medicine residency. As of June 2021, I am also a researcher at the University of Oldenburg and started my MD/PhD programme in December 2021. My research project has to do with fall prevention and the main topic is identifying risk factors for falls in elderly people. More specific, we try to see the effects of a better fitness on the fall risk and fall rate. And of course, also the impact of acute strenuous exercise on fall risk and fall rate in elderly people. #00:01:42-2#

Arber Gashi: I was always interested in science, doing scientific work and teaching as well as a structured PhD programme. As the MD/PhD at the University of Oldenburg offers both, working in a scientific programme as well as taking part in teaching.
