# Erasmus Mobility Experience Report - University of Stavanger, Norway

This report details my experience as an Erasmus Mundus student in the European Masters in Migration and Intercultural Relations program at the University of Stavanger, Norway, during the second semester.

We traveled by Flixbus from Oldenburg, Germany, to Oslo, Norway's capital, then took a train to Stavanger. The entire journey cost less than 100 euros. Arriving from Oldenburg, a city with minimal snowfall, the sight of snow-covered Norway was breathtaking.

Despite Europe witnessing the Aurora this year, we were unlucky not to see it from Stavanger. However, determined to experience this natural wonder, we embarked on a separate trip to Tromsø. To maximize your chances of witnessing the Aurora, I recommend planning a trip further north and staying for at least three days.

My time in Stavanger was an enriching and enjoyable experience. Despite the initial challenges of connecting with locals, I felt comfortable and welcomed in the city.
